



City Biodiversity Summit 2010

As one of the objectives of the Convention on Biological Diversity, the conservation of biological diversity requires initiatives taken not only at the national level but also at the local level. The role of local authorities, the ones implementing policy measures in the communities, has become crucial. As our lives deeply rely on natural resources around the world, their conservation is also an issue that must be addressed on a global scale. Therefore it is essential for local authorities from around the world to convene and exchange information.

As a venue of the 10th Conference of the Parties to the Convention on Biological Diversity (CBD COP 10), Aichi prefecture and the City of Nagoya will hold the City Biodiversity Summit in order to affirm the importance of cities and biodiversity, while calling out to the world the necessity of further expanding local efforts.

Local authorities from around the world will gather to discuss biodiversity related issues and the problems of their respective communities and present best practice cases for use in their community development.

Objectives

The City Biodiversity Summit aims to reaffirm the critical role of local authorities in biodiversity management, facilitate the sharing of information and exchange of experiences among local authorities worldwide in handling development and managing biodiversity, and to promote a significant expansion of local initiatives to conserve biodiversity. It also plans to validate the proposed CBD COP 10 Plan of Action on Cities, Local Authorities and Biodiversity, a needed plan for implementing the Convention on Biological Diversity at the local level, and to deliberate on the use of parameters and indicators (e.g. CBI) to enable local authorities to monitor biodiversity effectively.

The Summit outcomes will be consolidated in a declaration to be presented at the CBD·COP 10 High Level Segment, introducing initiatives taken by local governments worldwide.

Theme

Main theme: "Cities and Biodiversity-Local Governments Acting for Biodiversity"

Sub-themes

- Using nature to provide quality of life to urban citizens
- Allowing nature to stay, and bringing biodiversity back into cities
- Sustainable use of biodiversity in the urban context

Background

The first meeting on cities and biodiversity convened for local authorities took place in March 2007 in **Curitiba**, **Brazil**, the same venue where the CBD COP 8 was held in May 2006. The **Curitiba Declaration on Cities and Biodiversity**, which recognized "the crucial importance of the involvement of local authorities in the global efforts towards the protection and sustainable use of biodiversity," was adopted.

Then in May 2008, the **Mayors Conference on Local Actions for Biodiversity** was held in **Bonn**, **Germany** as a parallel event to the CBD COP 9. At the conference, a declaration recognizing the role of cities and calling for the Parties to the Convention on Biological Diversity (UN CBD) to support the conservation of biological diversity in cities was adopted.

At COP 9, the **Decision "Promoting engagement of cities and local authorities,"** which was the first decision involving local authorities, was adopted. The role of cities and local authorities in the implementation of the UN CBD gained international recognition.
